The seven ages of Les

(And there's going to be an eighth)

"WE'VE reached the seventh series of Sez Les—and I don't want to hear any cracks about the seven deadly sins either!" Les comments.

Fair enough. But people also talk about the Seven Ages of Man—and all the Sez Les crowd are firmly convinced that, as the star of Yorkshire Television's long-running variety hit has been around the scene for so long, he must be pushing it a bit when he says he's just coming up to 27. In fact, he's been coming up to 27 for so long, he must be approaching it on a down escalator.

"OK," Les admits. "Maybe I have put on a few years since Sez Les began. But how about the gags. They've stayed the same—and they were pretty old when the show started."

Mind you, Les hasn't done badly out of Sez Les.

"I've a terrific amount of work in the pipeline after this lot," he claims. "I'm signed up to play the lead in the 'Des O'Connor Story' and a big support role in a new version of 'Little Women,' with Hattie Jacques, Tessie O'Shea and Janet Webb, to say nothing about resident page turner for Jess Yates, and Fertiliser Consultant for 'Emmerdale Farm'..."

Seriously, though, Les HAS plenty lined up in addition to yet another batch of Sez Les programmes later in the year. He will be starring in his own Christmas show on television this year, and in December he is scheduled to go to Berlin to do six special shows for German Television—a contract which arose out of

says it is about an impressionist who, following the death of a President of the United States, is called in to impersonate the latter's voice so his death can be kept secret.

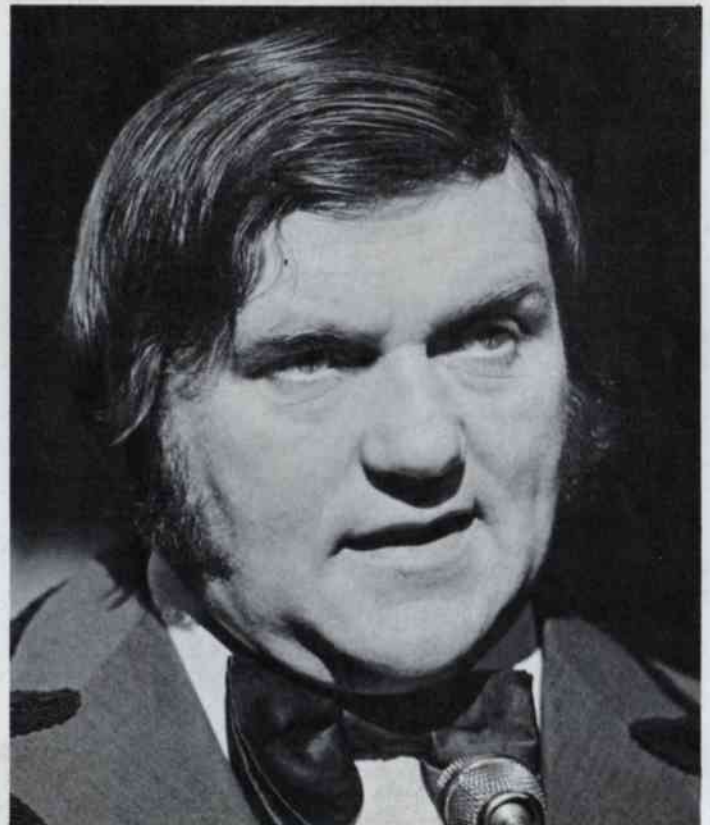
But back to the show. The format remains virtually unchanged—45 minutes with the accent strongly on comedy—patter, sketches and quickies, in which Les is assisted by such regulars as ROY BARRACLOUGH and ELI WOODS, plus other visiting artistes.

There will also be a full quota of music in the big-band style from the SYD LAWRENCE ORCHESTRA, which rocketed to fame with

the 1972 Golden Rose Television Festival at Montreux where an episode of Sez Les was shown. After the showing, the Head of Berlin Television telephoned to ask: "Who was the fat English clown who made us all laugh at Montreux?"

In addition, Les—who for the first time in years has had to give up a summer season and a pantomime because of his television commitments—has a crammed diary of variety club and cabaret bookings, besides establishing himself in a new venture, as a novelist.

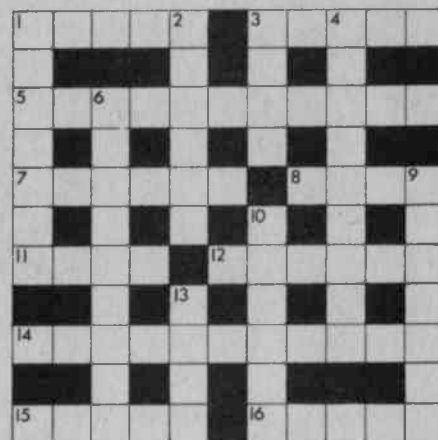

St Brelade's Fete — 10 hours of entertainment

THURSDAY, August 9, the day upon which St Aubin, the one time fishing village, harbour of the privateers of the 17th century and later one of the old shipbuilding sites of the island, will see again the St Brelade's Fete.

Upon that day, the venerable and ancient granite walls of the small harbour will resound with the revelry of the fete. The event, staged annually since 1909, with the exception of the intrusion of the wars, has become a leading part of the Jersey calendar of entertainment during the holiday season. Offering a variety of activities to many residents and visitors to the island over a long period of years the fete has also been the means of raising large sums for distribution to worthwhile causes.

A leading feature in recent years has been the attendance, through the good offices of the States Tourism Committee, of a famous military band and 1973

will be no exception, for promptly at 2 o'clock the entry of the Band of the Blues and the Royals into the fete arena will herald the commencement of this year's event.

Playing and counter-marching under the direction of Captain G. E. Evans, the band will be making a first appearance at St Aubin although as the Band of the Royal Horse Guards (The Blues) it did appear at the St Brelade's Fete in 1966.

Since then however, The Blues have been amalgamated with the Royal Dragoons (1st Dragoons) and a new British Army regiment, The Blues and The Royals has in consequence emerged. Both regiments, well endowed with richly deserved battle honours can trace their histories back through the ages to their establishment by Charles II as a part of the first regular army in 1661.

The full dress uniform of the new regiment remains that of the

Royal Horse Guards but the tunic sleeves now bear the embroidered eagle. The band, stationed at Hyde Park Barracks, London, is present with the Household Regiment upon most of the ceremonial parades and occasions which are a part of the London scene, as a mounted unit, although at St Aubin the band will be on foot. The 40 or so musicians will also appear later in the day when they present the tea-time band concert on the fete stage, under the baton of the Director of Music, Captain G. E. Evans.

Before that, however, the band will head the carnival cavalcade of fancy dress and floral exhibits in procession around the fete arena. A traditional part of the fete programme, the cavalcade is a colourful and animated contribution to the entertainment of the day. Numbered among the entries are usually quite a number of toddlers whose versatility and choice of costume invariably

present the judges with a difficult task of choosing the prize winners.

The fete stage upon which the later activities are presented, is erected partly in the harbour and elevated to afford easy viewing to even the smallest of stature, from any vantage point.

Comedians and vocalists, dancers and instrumentalists, bathing belles and muscle men — and aspirants for the title of the possessor of the knobbiest of knees will all be a part of the 10-hour continuous programme compered by the inimitable local actor/playwright Anthony Booth.

At the approach of midnight the kaleidoscope of the day is finalled by a spectacular display of continental fireworks signalling what the voluntary organising committee hope will have been another successful St Brelade's Fete.

Saving with Property Bonds to hedge against inflation

A WIDOW purchased a Property Bond just a little over 18 months ago for £4,000. Many of her friends advised her most earnestly not to do so. Today, her £4,000 investment is worth just over £4,801 — not bad considering the adverse conditions over the last 18 months.

A retired engineer put some of his capital, on his bank manager's advice, into Government Stock and has gradually seen it dwindle. War Loan, on Friday, July 20, 1973, slipped even further to a new all-time low of £32½ and the Gilt Edge market, with even more uncertainty, is already looking miserable. Short-dated stocks have been particularly hard hit recently.

These two illustrations set out the basic case for Property Bonds.

In the past the pattern of investment itself has helped to keep the poor poor and the rich rich. Those with the least money put whatever they can scrape together into fixed interest investments such as Building Societies, Bank deposit accounts, National Savings, finance houses and so on, while those with the most put theirs into property and shares. Inflation has robbed those with the least money of almost all of their gain, but has helped to boost the value of the investments of the rich by pushing up share and property prices.

A Property Bond is a fully rounded out package, only offered by a life assurance company, of investment management expertise, minimum guarantees, death benefits, taxation planning and the services of a life assurance intermediary.

It is not a savings account for deposits in the short term (for this see your bank); it is not a trading vehicle for taking quick gains or losses on the turn of the Stock Market (for this see a stockbroker); and it is not a vehicle for speculation or expectation of extraordinary gains — or losses.

The particular appeal of the Property Bond is that it is the only way in which a small investor with, say, a sum of £100, or the larger investor with £100,000 can put his savings in an investment vehicle the results of which are directly tied to real property.

The belief is based on past history and supported by the fundamentals of the property market that the income and capital growth on real property will offset inflation. This is because rents, on which property values are based are subject to the same inflationary pressures and at approximately the same time as other factors in the economy, also that the capital value of the units will not be subject to drastic and frequent changes.

One of the key fundamentals in this proposition is the rental yield on fully let properties, which provides good downside risk protection.

For the Jersey resident a Property Bond is an excellent form of investment since he is able to purchase a bond and claim income tax relief. Assuming the resident was aged 40 and made an investment of £10,000 he would have a very useful £20,940 of life cover protecting his investment and family, and he could claim income tax relief of £292 providing he meets certain qualifications, so he has bought his bond at a very good discount. If he had made his investment in July 1972 the bond would now be worth £12,500.

Now let us take the case of a young married man, wishing to protect his family and make some saving. Assuming he invested £12 per month, the income tax relief would be £2.40, making the net cost of his investment £9.40 a month. Over a 40 year period his net outlay would be £4,608 and at the end of the period he would have a nice tax-free sum of £5,800. Whilst he was saving he would have protected his in-

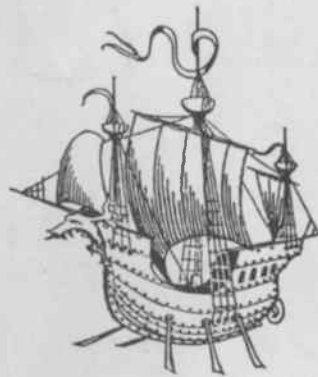
